FROM THE DESK OF the Rev. Dr. Anna Pinckney Straight



The other day I was talking with someone who had recently joined First Presbyterian Church, New Bern and mentioned some of the different worship services and events that would be at the church over the Advent and Christmas season. When I got to Candlelight and Christmas Eve, they got a puzzled look on their face. "Isn't Candlelight on Christmas Eve?" And I remembered.... not everybody knows the differences between all of these services. And... not everybody does things the way that we do! So, here is a short description of each that just might be helpful - for you or for you to share.

Advent Craft Fair: December 3, 9:30 am - 10:30 am: The Advent Craft Fair is a WONDERFUL fun event for all ages, held in the J. Murphy Smith Center during the Sunday School Hour on the first Sunday of Advent (December 3). Not only will there be crafts (making Advent wreaths and more) and refreshments, this is when you can pick up a devotional for the Advent season. This year we've added an outreach component to it- packing bags for Backpack Blessings that sends food home with students over the weekend and holidays to make sure kids aren't going hungry when they are away from the meal programs schools provide.

Hanging of the Greens: December 8, 9:00 am: Decorating the church for Advent and Christmas takes lots of hands. We need people who can tie bows, turn greenery into wreaths, hang greenery on just about everything that doesn't move, and more. While we have many gifted people who help, this is open to people (like me) who have no skills in these areas but are willing to learn and are happy to help! Don't worry if you can't arrive exactly at 9:00 am, but the work is usually done within a couple of hours.

Candlelight: December 10, 7:00 pm: In Person and live-streamed on the First Presbyterian Church, New Bern YouTube page. Candlelight is a deeply loved tradition for many - a service similar to lessons and carol in which all of our choirs (adult, children, and handbell) lead worship, ending with the lighting of candles. After Candlelight we head over to a reception in the Session House. At this service the offering goes to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s Joy Offering, providing assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need and developing our future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges

equipping communities of color.

Longest Night: December 21, 7:00 pm: In person and livestreamed on the First Presbyterian Church, New Bern YouTube page. The holidays are, for many, a difficult time. The pressure to be happy or cheerful when you are struggling or grieving can be a significant challenge - even those who have great joy in their lives can also be carrying great grief. The Longest Night service (named because it is traditionally held on the winter solstice- when the night is, quite literally, the longest) is a quiet, contemplative service of worship when we acknowledge these things. This is for anyone who is grieving as well as anyone who might just need some moments of quiet. In other words: everyone.

Fourth Sunday of Advent: December 24, 8:30 am and 11:00 am: As happens every few years, this is a year when the Fourth Sunday of Advent happens to fall on Christmas Eve. So, on Sunday morning we will use Biblical texts and themes for this final Sunday of Advent, transitioning to Christmas Eve at the end of the service. The 11:00 am service will be livestreamed in our YouTube page as it is each Sunday.

Christmas Eve: 5:00 pm: In person and livestreamed on the First Presbyterian Church, New Bern YouTube page. The 5:00 pm service is our family service and it is led by the children and youth of the congregation. Last count, Catherine Campbell had more than 50 worship leaders signed up! You don't have to have children to worship at 5:00 pm, but you do have to bring an appreciation for exuberant - and occasionally chaotic - joy. We will receive an offering during the service that will be given to Interfaith Refugee Ministry, and the service ends with candlelight, too. While every year is different, last year this service was standing-room-only.

Christmas Eve: 7:00 pm: In person and livestreamed on the First Presbyterian Church, New Bern YouTube page. The 7:00 pm service is our traditional Christmas Eve service that includes both communion and candlelight at the end. We will sing carols and hear God's word read and proclaimed as we celebrate that Jesus was born and that Jesus has promised to come again. This service will include an offering that will be given to Interfaith Refugee Ministry.

And.... this year there are two additional invitations I am privileged to share with you! Our neighbors at Temple B'nai Sholem (their sanctuary opens up to Middle Street and is directly next to us) want us to join in their Hanukkah celebrations!

What is Hanukkah? The holiday of Hanukkah recalls the battle for survival by the Jewish people, led by the Maccabees, against the oppressive forces of the Syrian-Greek King Antiochus, who sought to stamp out Jewish traditions and faith. The Hebrew word "Hanukkah" means "dedication," and during the eight days of the holiday those who celebrate remember the dedication of their ancestors to the cherished values of Jewish tradition. Each night, as candles on the candelabra, the Hanukkiah, or Hanukkah menorah are lit, the great miracle of the victory of the small band of Jews against the mighty Syrian-Greek empire and the rededication of the ancient Temple in Jerusalem after its defilement is remembered and celebrated.

December 7, 5:15 pm: The first night of Hannukah with a candle lighting (with their new menorah!) at the gazebo at Union Point Park.

December 10, 12:00 pm - 4:00 pm: A Hannukah party at First Presbyterian Church's J. Murphy Smith Center. We are being invited to join in the celebration that will include latkes, a klezmer band, and more! The cost for tickets to this event is \$15 and they would like to have all RSVPs by December 3. For more information, look <u>HERE</u>.

And, starting on December 8, you will see that that First Presbyterian Church, in

solidarity with our neighbors (we have been neighbors for more than 125 years), we will have our own menorah in the First Presbyterian Church yard. The Session of First Presbyterian Church has been talking about what we can do to combat the recent rise in antisemitism. In conversation with leaders at Temple B'nai Sholem we were invited to place a menorah in our yard during Hannukah (there are three other churches in downtown New Bern who will be doing this, too!) As Christians, we light these lights of the Hanukkah menorah this year in solidarity with the Jewish people. We understand that we are not coopting a sacred practice of the Jews for our own purposes. We light these lights to demonstrate to the world that we stand with our Jewish neighbors for increasing light in the world.

I'm looking forward to all of the ways we will worship together in the coming weeks. It is good to be together. *Anna Pinckney Straight*



It only makes sense to select an author who has been of interest to many in our congregation over the years who also has a great Christmas book for your holiday reading. That would be J. Ellsworth







Since then, subsequent classes and Bible study groups have utilized several of the Back Side books in which "Kalas explores something that is central in a Christian life but often difficult to understand."



Food Lion, as they remain great partners in supplying food and bags at a low cost. A huge number of Food Lion employees from LOTS of different areas of Eastern NC, showed up to pack with us. As you will note from the photos, 19 First Presbyterians joined together in this effort. Singly, we each made a difference, but teaming up we are all unstoppable. We opened food packaging, set up tables, then went round and round those tables filling our bags. We are joined by well over 23 partnering churches, businesses, and the hospital in this important ministry.

Haiti Mission Update



HAITI MISSION STILL BEARING FRUIT

In 1985 our congregation was searching for a way to do outreach work internationally when they were introduced to some exciting work in Haiti. A few individuals traveled to Haiti to look at needs and opportunities. While helping a Presbyterian missionary build fish ponds, they were introduced to some exciting work going on through CODEP (Comprehensive Development Project), a visionary Haitiian-based non-profit that was tackling the important long-term goals of reforestation and leadership development.

Nearly all the forests in the mountains had been cleared which resulted in severe erosion and loss of agriculture—jobs and food supply. In addition, many of the Haitian people lacked hope, education, and leadership skills.

The dream grew steadily as more congregants visited Haiti and helped with work projects. From the early 1990's until the earthquake in 2010, over forty people from First Presbyterian joined this work, some helping state-side raising money and keeping books, others showing up to do boots-on-the-ground labor. There are at least 10 people still active

in our church who were apart of the Haiti Project—the U.S.-based non-profit that raised money and supported the work of CODEP. First Presbyterians made over 15 trips to Haiti to support this vision.

Over more than fifteen years. our volunteers partnered with Haitians in planting trees to knit back together the eroding, denuded mountains. We supported the Haitians in small towns in getting more education and developing stronger leadership skills. After the earthquake the trips stopped, but the support continued. With help from First Presbyterian Church and other groups, the work of CODEP continued. Beginning in 2013, their work expanded to include over 68 communities and over 1400 Haitian farmers, half of whom are women. Over 500,000 new trees are being planted each year. Education and leadership development have remained a priority. This work has continued despite political instability, the pandemic, and natural disasters.

The long-term commitment of volunteers from First Presbyterian Church continues to yield benefits. Local Haitian leaders are now passing the baton to a new generation of Haitian leaders! Barbarah Cenat is one such person. Barbarah is conquering systemic poverty in moving toward a 5-year university degree in agriculture and eventual leadership in CODEP. Riding daily on a small motor scooter up long mountain roads to the university, she is pursuing a better life for herself and her country.

Habitat for Humanity: Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity, brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope. Habitat for Humanity of Craven County has helped more that 70 families realize their dream of purchasing a decent, affordable home. This group provides homebuyer education, community educational

initiatives, and neighborhood revitalization programs that focus on critical repairs.

The Food Bank, New Bern Branch, that serves Carteret, Craven, Pamlico, Jones, and Onslow Counties: The Food Bank is a nonprofit organization that has provided food for those facing hunger in central and eastern North Carolina for over 40 years. The Food Bank works every day to provide food to people in need while building solutions to end hunger in our communities. Through partnerships, education, and programs, the Food Bank empowers communities to overcome hunger, creating an environment where people thrive.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance: This organization enables congregations of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to witness the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crises and catastrophic events. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance focuses on the long-term recovery of disaster impacted communities. It provides training and disaster preparedness for Presbyterians and synods. It also works collaboratively with church partners and members of the ACT Alliance (Action by Churches Together) internationally, and nationally with other faith-based responders.
